The V.P. Corner by "Klondike" Mike



Most of these eastern men were entangled in unromantic routines and responsibilities. The very notion of gold had made many a good man succumb as to a plaque. The mountains to the west as well as Denver City and Auraria were a place where a man was a law unto himself-as long as he had a quick hand with knife or six shooter." Food was nothing fancy plain fare such as beans, coffee, bread, and bacon. If he kept his life simple and his tastes even simpler he could work when he wanted and still be able to squander his left over money on the gaming tables and at the bar. Though women were not plentiful for a small price a man could pleasure himself with Indian and Mexican girls.



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“But men were thick as ticks on a dead log.” They were young, dirty, unshaven and vigorous. Not being able to afford new expensive duds in the stores they were left to roam the streets and saloons in their rags. Well-groomed and newly arrived even the easterner soon satisfied himself with the “half-Mexican, half-Indian garb of buckskin trousers, wool flannel shirt and felt slouch hat, the entire ensemble overlaid with dust.”

Endless files of Conestoga wagons snaked out of Denver City along the serpentine Vasquez Fork Trail toward Golden City.” Needing a day to a day and a half to cover the fourteen miles to the bustling little town at the foot of the mountains the caravans followed the swift, rocky stream now called Clear Creek.

The going monthly rate was a dollar-fifty per head and a few enterprising pioneers in the region set themselves up as the first cattle businesses.

Prospecting/Mining Notes:

(mostly from the Denver Post, Internet and other wire services)

Illegal Milling of Gold: Colorado State Officials are now asking the Federal Government to look into how bad the pollution really is. While the town of Mancos worries over what a rogue gold mill may have put into the water, soil and air, Colorado mining authorities have called on the federal government to deal with what has been described as one of the most serious cases of pollution from illegal gold milling in the entire state. The EPA is being asked to consider if the Red Arrow Gold Corp. Mine site should be declared a Superfund cleanup. Mancos is about 40 miles west of Durango.

Gold and Oil Jump while Stocks Drop Sharply: The recent problems and unrest in Syria following the chemical weapons attacks on their own people has resulted in a drop in the Stock Market indexes across the board. This was followed almost immediately with oil going to a record high and gold jumping from 1300 an ounce quickly up to 1420 an ounce. It is fairly traditional that when the stocks drop dramatically, oil and gold experience just as dramatic increases.



September Birthstone

Sapphire

The September birthstone, has been popular since the Middle Ages and, according to folklore, will protect your loved ones from envy and harm. Medieval clergy wore sapphires to symbolize heaven, while commoners thought the gem attracted heavenly blessings. Blue sapphires range from very light to very dark greenish or violetish blue, as well as various shades of pure blue. Back in the Day.....

SPANISH BAR: Two miles west of Idaho springs on south Clear Creek is the site of Spanish Bar. The place was named for or by the many Mexican prospectors who worked the area in the 1860's. Some good gold was found here.

The area was worked off and on for years. A big revival took place around 1880 when the population was nearly 400, and there were several active mines and mills. The largest mill was the Freeland. Mike Dougherty, an early Colorado favorite character, claimed that he was the first 'to discover grass on Spanish Bar."

LAMARTINE: A Denver jeepster claims there are two or three jeep trails to this well hidden old town. He admits however, that none of the trails are very well marked. For those interested, he says that the best route is five miles up State Hwy. 103 along Chicago Creek, then a steep old road to the west up Ute Creek Canyon, then due north over meadowland to the town. Anyhow, it is near the top of the hill.

The town grew around the Lamartine Mine, which got off to a slow start but produced several millions in gold, silver and lead before it was washed up in the early 1900's. It seems that gold was found here early, but the claims weren't developed. A fellow named Himrod eventually bought all of the claims for about \$200.00. He spent thousands trying to develop the claims but got very little back in the way of profit. He eventually sold out for about \$360.00 and the new owners, almost immediately, started making money hand over fist.

That was when the town was built. It flourished during the 80's and 90's and into the early 1900's, as long as the Lamartine continued to pay off. But the peak population of the town never exceeded 500. The Lamartine Tunnel further developed the property.

There is much left today....if you can find it!

FREELAND: A frightening four mile drive over a narrow ledge road, made more for jeeps than anything else, will take the interested to the ghost town of Freeland. The route is lined with shaft houses and mine dumps, once the source of prosperity for the mining camp.



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Freeland was born about 1880 with some rich strikes made nearby. It soon had a population of more than 400 and had some 80 cabins and frame houses, two stores, a saloon and a public school. It was a peaceful and industrious little community. It depended upon the Freeland, Lone Tree and other mines. When they faded, then so did Freeland. About the only distinction ever achieved here was an interest that former New York Senator Lehman had in one of the mines.

BONITO: A small community grew up around the smelters and the mills that treated the ores of the nearby mines. The largest smelter was the Bullion, build in 1884, to treat the ores from the Freeland Mine. The smelter employed some 25 men in its day. Some ruins of cabins and mills remain at the site.

FALL RIVER: Mines, mills and cabins once lined the Fall River from Clear Creek to St. Mary's Glacier. In this hodge-podge however, only two or three camps emerged clearly: Alice, Fall River and Silver City. Fall River, which began near the junction of the Fall River and Clear Creek, ran quite a distance up the narrow valley. It had two large mills and several smaller ones, dozens of cabins and prosperous businesses.

The camp reached its peak in the early 80's. Ten new discoveries were made in 1880, four of which were said to be 'unusually rich' in free gold. All the new strikes were owned by Commodore Kane and his associates of New York City. The Kane Company constructed a tunnel to cut into each of the new diggings. Foundations of the mill and several old cabins remain at the site.

Beginners "How To" Class

On Sunday, Aug 4, President Long conducted a Class on Clear Creek at 68th and Washington for beginning prospectors and others who wanted to sharpen up on their panning and sluicing skills. He was joined by folks who wanted to learn a little and that is exactly what we did. After discussing where gold comes from and learning how to read a stream and where to look to find the gold, we learned the basics of panning and how to break in our new pan. We also learned how important it is to classify your material before panning. Then everybody got to practice with some concentrates that I had dug from the stream earlier.



After ensuring that everyone was able to pan down to the black sand, we then learned how to pan the gold out of the black sand. We also learned that there is no substitute for patience and practice. We then moved over to a sluice box. Everyone learned how to easily clean up the sluice and I showed the value of rough panning the material at the stream to reduce the concentrates taken home. Most people take way too much home and a lot of that material is non-gold bearing.

LAKE GULCH OUTING

The Lake Gulch Outing took place on August 24 at the Clay County Mine near Blackhawk. Some 45 members took part in the prospecting outing. The weather was nice and cool until early afternoon when the rain hit. That area has had a lot of rain during the recent southwestern monsoon that strikes every late summer in Colorado. When it rains, it is harder to dig at this claim since it is primarily a dry claim, and the wetness makes the classifying more difficult.

I want to thank the owner of the claim, Larry, who has made his property available for the Club for a couple of years now. We certainly appreciate his graciousness in doing so. I also want to thank Mike Hurtado who, even though he was pretty much under the weather,

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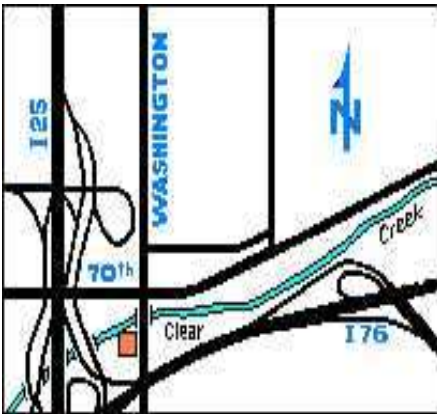
