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

After dinner did some gambling (yes I lost), called it a night, and went back to the room and to relax for the remainder of the evening and go over the class schedule for the next two days.

On Saturday, a crisp clear day, we had a field trip to the Cripple Creek and Victor (CC&V) Gold Mining Company. The sheer size of this impressive mining operation, with its three-story-tall trucks being loaded and driving by us to their dumping location, was a sight to behold. We later had an opportunity to climb up on one of those huge trucks in whose bed you could fit an entire house! We also had presentations by our four excellent instructors, Glenn Beattie, veteran gold prospector; Rich Frettered, a hard rock miner for 18 years; Loren Lowe, past president of the Colorado Springs Mineralogical Society; and Steven Veatch, an adjunct professor of earth science at Emporia State University.

Sunday started out as another clear day with gold panning, a field trip to the Trading and Transfer Building, and a visit to the Cripple Creek Museum. Many a millionaire was made in this town. We again were treated to presentations by our four instructors.

Sunday also was the day when a snowstorm was going to cross through the Rockies. In the afternoon, the sky started to change so I started home about 3:00 p.m. back up 67 north to the Divide

where the sky had darkened considerably. It started snowing before I got halfway to 24 east and I was slipping and sliding around turns. The snow continued unabated and I could no longer identify the road, let alone know what lane I was in. Everything was white. As I reached 24 east and slid towards the Springs, the snow began to lighten up a bit and I thought I was out of the main storm. But as I headed north on 25 towards Monument Pass, I drove right into the main storm that dropped right over me into blizzard conditions and total white-out. Trucks and cars were all over the road. Many were stopped on the freeway and you couldn't see them until the last second, creating an obstacle course for a blind man. At this point I decided that as long as my truck was moving at least 5 miles per hour and I didn't hit anything or come to a stop, I could keep going in and around cars and trucks. I wasn't going to stop because I knew I would not get my rear-wheel-drive truck moving again.

That night I drove over curbs, was in oncoming lanes, went through red lights, slipped around cars, slid circles around light poles trying to turn and guessing where the street might be. Driving mostly sideways, it seemed, it took me most of the evening to get home. I have a few more white hairs from that ride, but the 5th Annual Cripple Creek School of Prospecting was outstanding.


The Annual Ken Barker Award was established in November 2003 to honor the memory of Kenneth Barker, Vice President of the Gold Prospectors of the Rockies 2003. The award is designed to recognize the Club member who most closely exemplifies the love and passion for gold prospecting that Ken brought to the organization.

The Nominating Committee shall preside over the selection process for this award.

- All Club Members and Board Members in good standing, with the exception of the President and Vice-President, shall be eligible for this award.
- The recipient of this award will be selected by secret ballot at the November General meeting.
- A ballot form will be made available to all members in good standing as they check in at the membership table at the November General meeting.
- An appropriate container to receive completed and signed ballots will be made available.
- Absentee ballot forms, to be used only by those members who cannot attend the November General Meeting, will be available in the November issue of The Gold Nugget. The signed and completed form must be mailed to the Club Post Office Box and be postmarked no later than November 30 to be considered.
- In December, the Committee Coordinator shall tally the ballots and present the names of the nominees to the Board. The nominated member who receives the most votes will be the winner. In the event of a tie, the Board will select one of the finalists to receive this award.
- The President shall, at the January meeting, present \$100 cash and a "Ken Barker Award" plaque to the selected winner.
- The Committee Coordinator shall cause an article about the award and the recipient to be published in the February newsletter.

Dowsing

Have you ever considered that life offers more than you've experienced? Have you ever thought that each day could become a brand new adventure? Have you ever reasoned that you could be more than you've been taught you can be? Have you ever imagined that you could access your own inner-knowledge which could allow you to be happier and more successful in life? Have you ever dreamt that you could locate/find hidden treasure? Well, as you learn to develop your own dowsing abilities, all of this can become available to you.

All limitation we experience is self-created. It was Albert Einstein who said that there are two ways to look at life. One way, is that every moment is filled with routines and mundane activities. The other way, is that every moment is filled with miracles. Which way do you view life? And now that you understand it is a choice, which way do you choose to view life?

Dowsing is a natural ability, dormant in most individuals, which can relatively easily be awakened. Every language on the face of this planet has at least one word for dowsing. It is an ability which was available to cavemen (as depicted in 9,000 year old cave paintings found in North Africa and Peru), throughout mankind's history (a statue of a Chinese Emperor holding a dowsing rod, dated: 2258 BC; the Church outlawing dowsing for the common-man in 553 AD and reserving dowsing abilities thereafter only for priests), and up through modern times (every public utility has a dowser on staff; the US Marines offer special dowsing training to selected recruits).

Dowsing is simply the ability to connect to one's higher state of guidance--ask questions and get answers. From a scientific perspective, it is the ability to access information available through the right-side of our brains (in the Western world, most individuals operate almost exclusively through the left-side of their brains). Mark your calendars for Saturday, May 22, 2004, when we will be holding a GPR outing, complete with a metal detecting competition hunt and gold panning. After the formal outing activities, I will guide all GPR members who are interested in a brief dowsing class so you can begin to develop your dowsing abilities.

In addition to being the VP of the Mile-High Dowsing Society, Hank both practices and teaches alternative healing throughout the United States. All who attend his Spiritual Response Therapy (SRT) classes are taught to develop highly effective dowsing abilities that are applicable for use in their daily lives.
