





Largest-Ever Hoard of Gold Anglo-Saxon Coins Found by Amah-Rose Abrams, November 4, 2021

A Metal Detectorist Has Found What Is Now Declared the Largest-Ever Hoard of Gold Anglo-Saxon Coins in His Backyard. The Crown is determining whether the trove is legally considered treasure.

One man, in one field, has amassed what is now being declared the largest-ever haul of Anglo-Saxon gold coins. The metal detectorist, who wishes to remain anonymous, discovered the 131 coins over the course of 30 years on his own land, finding a few at a time until he gradually built up what is now considered the largest trove ever found. The East Norfolk-based man first found a coin around 1990, but most of the treasure was discovered between 2014 and 2020. Classed as bullion, the find is made up of mostly Frankish tremisses dating from 580 A.D. to 630 A.D. and contains nine Roman gold solidi, a larger coin worth three tremisses, a gold pendant, two pieces of gold, a small gold bar, and smaller parts of what are believed to be items of jewelry. In a strange twist, an ex-policeman found 10 coins in the same field, tried to pass them off as several different finds to sell them, but was busted in 2017. He was fired from the police and sentenced to 16 months in prison.

“This internationally significant find reflects the wealth and Continental connections enjoyed by the early Kingdom of East Anglia,” said Tim Pestell, senior curator of archaeology at Norwich Castle Museum and Art Gallery. “Study of the hoard and its find spot has the potential to unlock our understanding of early trade and exchange systems and the importance of west Norfolk to East Anglia’s ruling kings in the seventh century.” The fate of the hoard currently hangs in the balance as the local coroner is deciding whether the items can be designated as treasure, which must be over 300 years old and made up of more than 10 percent precious metals. If this is the case, it belongs to the Crown, which will claim the find before selling it to Norwich Castle Museum with the support of the British Museum. The find rivals the most famous East Anglian discovery from the same period Sutton Hoo in neighboring Suffolk, which contained a larger amount of gold but fewer coins. It also confirms that while coins were not yet being minted in the area, currency from elsewhere was being used.

“This is a hugely important find,” said early medieval coins curator at the British Museum Gareth William. “It is the largest coin hoard of the period known to date. It must be seen alongside other recent finds from East Anglia and elsewhere and will help to transform our understanding of the economy of early Anglo-Saxon England.”



Amateur Divers Discover 'Enormously Valuable' Hoard of Roman Coins (CNN) September 2021

Two amateur free divers have found one of the largest collections of Roman coins in Europe off the east coast of Spain. Luis Lens and César Gimeno were diving off the island of Portitxol in Xàbia on August 24 when they found eight coins, before further dives by archaeologists returned another 45 coins, according to a press release from the University of Alicante on Tuesday. Scientists from the university's Institute in Archaeology and Historical Heritage then analyzed the perfectly preserved coins, dating them to between the end of the 4th century and the beginning of the 5th century. The coins were in such good condition that the inscriptions were legible, allowing the team to identify coins from the reign of a number of Roman emperors. Three date from Valentinian I, seven from Valentinian II, 15 from Theodosius I, 17 from Arcadius, 10 from Honorius and there is one unidentified coin. Alongside the coins divers found three nails, likely made from copper, as well as lead remains which could be from a severely deteriorated sea chest. Jaime Molina Vidal, professor of ancient history at the University of Alicante and leader of the team of underwater archaeologists, said this was one of the largest sets of Roman gold coins found in Europe. "It's very significant," Molina Vidal told CNN on Thursday. "It's enormously valuable."

Trove of Gold Artifacts From Pre-Viking Era Unearthed by Amateur Treasure Hunter

Call it beginner's luck, but Ole Ginnerup Schytz is going to have a hard time topping his first-ever metal detector find. Within a few hours of trying out his brand-new metal detector, the Denmark-based amateur treasure hunter stumbled upon a trove of Iron Age jewelry. The discovery, which dates back to the 6th century, offers a glimpse into life before the Viking era. During the 6th century, Denmark was in the Germanic Iron Age—a period of transition that lasted from the end of the Roman Empire to the start of the Viking Age. Around that time, "a rich Nordic art of animal styles developed," explained the National Museum of Denmark. "At the same time, we also see the first images of the Nordic gods, which in many ways mirror known Roman gods," they added. Now, experts are saying that the artifacts, discovered in December near the town of Jelling, are some of the most significant ever found in the nation's history.

"This is the biggest find that has come in the 40 years I have been at the National Museum," said archeologist Peter Vang Petersen, according to Artnet News. Ole Ginnerup Schytz reportedly discovered the trove after his metal detector sounded its alarm. He began to dig and soon found a piece of metal. "It was scratched and covered in mud," explained Schytz to TV Syd, as translated by Artnet News. "I had no idea, so all I could think of was that it looked like the lid of a can of herring."

As reported by a translated press release from the museum Vejlemuseerne, the items found by Schytz consist of bracteates, or "saucer-sized, beautifully decorated medallions." These would have been popular as jewelry in Northern Europe at the time, offering wearers magical protection via runes, noted Smithsonian Magazine. Roman coins that had been made into jewelry were also discovered in the stash. In total, the twenty-two artifacts weighed slightly more than two pounds. They had been buried about 1,500 years ago in a longhouse.

The amount of wealth signified by the large quantity of gold suggests that the area was a center of power at the time. Vejlemuseerne's research director Mads Ravnt explained: "Only one member of society's absolute top [would have] been able to collect a treasure like the one found here." Researchers suspect that a climate crisis, caused by a volcanic eruption in 536 A.D., might have prompted the items' burial. The volcano released a cloud of ash, resulting in famine, and people were likely to have used the gold jewelry as offerings to the gods, reported Artnet.

The collection is set to be exhibited at the Vejlemuseerne in early 2022, followed by a show at the National Museum.
