The Golden Asteroid ву

NASA's 'Psyche Mission' to uncover gold in space...

Once considered unimportant space junk, asteroids are now viewed as treasure troves that can unlock galaxy secrets and provide us valuable resources. Right now, a tennis court sized spacecraft is traversing the stars in the early months of its 2.2 billion-mile journey to an asteroid unlike any other. While most asteroids are made up of rock, dust, or even ice, this one, known as Psyche, is metal rich. By analyzing density, radar reflection, and thermal projection, scientists estimate up to 60% of its volume is metal. It's believed to be comprised of nickel, iron, and precious metals like gold and silver. Early valuations reported Forbes magazine estimate that the Psyche asteroid's metals are worth more than \$10,000 quadrillion, which is one followed by 15 zeros! That is more than the entire global economy today, so it is no wonder that sensationalized headlines have read that the asteroid 'would make everyone on earth a billionaire.' It is an unlikely outcome since NASA doesn't have the technology to bring an asteroid to Earth, though those dollar estimates are certainly eye-opening. Instead, the Psyche mission is for its spacecraft to enter the asteroid's orbit and study its composition up close. This will open the doors for future asteroid exploration and is already spurring interest in space mining expeditions.

Psyche was discovered over 170 years ago:

Psyche is the 16th asteroid ever identified and is sometimes referred to as 16 Psyche. Italian astronomer Annibale de Gasparis first spotted the unknown object in the sky on the evening of March 17, 1852, at the Capodimonte Observatory

in Naples. He tracked its course over several nights and confirmed it as an asteroid. De Gasparis was no strange to such discoveries as this was one of 10 that he identified, making him one of the 19 century's most successful astronomers. He named the asteroid after the Greek goddess of the soul, Psyche, whose extraordinary beauty was known to make even the goddess of love, Venus, jealous. It seems fitting then that this large, M-type asteroid would contain the most desirable metal of all, gold. For over a century, after it was identified, astronomers used ground-based telescopes to study Psyche. They discovered it has an irregular potato shape and orbits the sun between Mars and Jupiter in what's known as the Asteroid Belt. As technology has advanced over the last decades, it has become clear that this asteroid has overwhelming metallic properties unlike others.



Prospects of the Golden Asteroid

Unexplored metal rich lands are a gold prospector's dream and that is precisely what is being described on the Psyche asteroid. "There aren't that many completely unexplored types of worlds in our solar system." Lindy Elkins-Tanton. Psyche mission's principal investigator at Arizona State University, told Space.com. "We visited, either in person or robotically, worlds made of rock and worlds made of ice and worlds made of gas...but this will be our first time visiting a world that has a metal surface." The allure of those metal deposits, like gold, platinum, nickel and iron, has so many excited about the prospects of the Psyche mission. It has put a spotlight on the commercial potential of space explorations, particularly involving the mining of asteroids. Legislation like the 2015 US Commercial Space Launch Competitiveness Act allows investors to stake their intergalactic claim legally and has led to several asteroid-mining startups, like AstroForge of Karman. Earlier, we reported that the overall estimate of Psyche's value is \$10,000,000,000,000,000 if it were minable, but in gold alone, it is predicted to have trillions of dollars, according to Bitcoin.com. So, where are these gold deposits hiding? We'll have to wait until 2029 for the Psyche rocket to enter the asteroid's orbit for an exact answer, but in the meantime, planetary scientists are mapping out what they expect to find. In the Journal of Geophysical Research: Planets, scientists presented high-resolution maps of the Psyche asteroid's surface composition using Atacama Lare Millimeter/submillimeter Array (ALMA) telescopes in Chili. The findings show highly conductive, dense surfaces, indicting diverse metal-rich regions scattered throughout the asteroid. Variations in the asteroid's temperature reveal large craters believed to be filled with finer sand-like hot materials versus rockier ground along the rim. Phillip Metzger, a physicist at the University of Central Florida, tells Space.com that he believes "asteroid mining will be a real thing, and it will be profitable" once the necessary technology is developed. He predicts that smaller M-type asteroids, closer to Earth, will be successfully mined first.

The True Gold for Scientists:

In listening to the Psyche team describe their mission, it's clear that for them, the true gold of this groundbreaking expedition doesn't involve any tangible metal. What they are most interested in is uncovering secrets of planetary



formation. Andy Rivkin, an astronomer who previously led NASA's DART mission, tells the New York Times, "We will never get to Earth's core...visiting these kinds of objects will give us information that we could extrapolate to learn more about Earth and apply that to different planets." The Psyche mission is expected to provide a rare window into the history of the celestial matter that forms planets like Earth and even the ancient solar system. The data hints that this potato shaped asteroid might be a leftover fragment of a much larger, old planetary object. A second leading theory suggests it was once the core of an early proto planet that didn't fully form due to violent celestial collisions. Psyche's metal composition is so unique that it might even surprise researchers with an entirely different origin story they have yet to hypothesize.

The Psyche Mission is Already Underway:

Many watched in awe as the NASA Discovery Program's 14th mission successfully launched from the Kennedy Space



Center in Florida on the morning of Oct. 13, 2023. The spacecraft is now on a trajectory to pass Mars by the spring of 2026, leveraging the planets gravity for an extra boost. New Hall-effect thruster technology, which operates at five times greater efficiency than standard rockets, is being used in deep space for the first time. It will take another 29 months after sling-shotting from Mars before the space rocket reaches Psyche around August 2029. It'll then orbit the asteroid until at least 2031. Once there, the team will map the asteroid, measuring its magnetic field and gravity to understand its metal composition better. The final phase will last over two years, with the mission expected to end in November 2031.

How NASA Will Uncover Psyche's Metal Composition: Prospecting in outer space requires specialized tools and equipment like on Earth, so it makes sense that the uncrewed Psyche SpaceX Falcon Heavy spacecraft carries a slew of advanced machinery on board to explore the asteroids formation and composition. The equipment is operated remotely by the team of engineers at NASA's Propulsion Laboratory. Scientists will analyze the asteroid with a gamma-ray and neutron spectrometer (GRNS) to better understand Psyche's formation. Cosmic rays and high energy particles interact with atoms in the rocks and metals to emit neutrons and gamma-rays. By matching those emissions to known elements, scientists can gain clues about the asteroids composition to find gold or other metal deposits. The spacecraft is also fitted with a magnetometer, which will be used to detect evidence of an old magnetic field. Typically, asteroids are frozen and unable to radiate magnetic energy, whereas a rocky planet like Earth has a molten metallic core. If a magnetic field is detected, it would be a powerful indicator That Psyche began as a protoplanetary core, as some have hypothesized. Another tool used is a multispectral imager, housing telescopic lenses with special filters. It will be used to photograph Psyche's surface in various wave lengths of light to map its geology, such as craters and cliffs. A 3D surface model would then reveal the location of gold and other metal deposits while offering greater insight into the asteroid's history. Lastly, gravity testing will be done using the spacecraft's telecommunications system. Radio waves used for communication can be analyzed to measure how the asteroid interacts with the spacecraft's orbit. Psyche's mass, rotation and gravity field can all be verified this way, further helping scientists understand its interior structure.

The Future of Asteroid Minin Many believe the finding of the Psyche mission could yield a new space race to uncover mining opportunities throughout our solar system. What was once only possible on the big screen is now within our reach as we stretch our prospective exploration beyond planetary boundaries. Already, several startups are developing plans for space mining. The New York Times recently highlighted asteroid mining fir AstroForges's launch plans for this year. Their Odin mission will observe a possible M-type asteroid circling Earth's orbit, and they've already raised over \$13 million from investors. The company won't disclose the steroid publicly, as they're concerned about competitors

claiming a stake. If the mission succeeds, it will be the first entirely launch of its kind. Denver based Karman is another business founded on asteroid mining will be a profitable endeavor. Unlike AstroForge, they extracting large quantities of raw materials like water and clay, in hopes in space and developing satellite-servicing infrastructure and space based in the mix is Los Angeles based company TransAstra, a recipient of develop asteroid ming technologies. TransAstra is developing spacecraft debris or position inter-steller observation satellites. The challenge will

for around \$1.16 billion. Despite the challenges, human beings are forging ahead on a path toward greater space discovery. "I think that it is fundamental to who we are and also who we should be." Says Elkins-Tanton. Perhaps the next generations' prospecting adventures will occur between Mars and Jupiter and no longer be limited to Earth.

Gold Bars and Coins vs. Silver Bars and Coins: Which Is Better For investors?

Thanks to inflation, high interest rates and overall economic uncertainty, many Americans have looked toward precious metals in recent years. These investments often provide a low-risk way to both protect wealth and, in many cases, even grow it. Interest in precious metals has grown so much that even big-box stores like Costco have begun selling gold and silver bars and coins.

But while both of these can be good options for investors, in some cases, one may be a better choice than the other.

"Some individuals purchase silver as if it were a perfect substitute for gold simply because both are precious metals and the price of the former is usually a fraction of the latter," says Peter C. Earle, a senior economist with the American Institute for Economic Research. "But there are differences in demand, liquidity, and performance under various market and economic conditions which make them similar — but quite imperfect — as substitutes."

Not sure if you should put your money in gold or silver bars and coins? Below, we'll break down what experts have to say. Start exploring your gold and silver investing options online here.

Gold bars and coins vs. silver bars and coins: Which is better for investors?

Here's how to tell when each precious metal type may be preferable, according to the experts we spoke to.

When gold bars and coins are better for investors

If you're mostly worried about inflation and the declining value of your dollar, gold bars and coins are going to be the better option over silver, some experts say.

"Generally speaking, gold will be a more suitable inflation hedge," says Matt Willer, managing director of capital markets at Phoenix Capital Group Holdings.

This is because gold is more scarce, yet retains high demand — both from investors and various governments across the world. Silver — which is much more available and used in many industrial ways — sees more ebbs and flows in demand and pricing. This also makes gold a lower-risk investment, so if you're more conservative with your money, you may want to choose gold rather than silver, according to experts.

"Prices for silver can be volatile," Earle says. "And in a severe depression, while gold is likely to rise in price, it's conceivable that the price of silver may actually fall as demand for the products and processes utilizing it decline."

Finally, if you're short of storage space (or don't want to pay for a lot of it), gold can also be the better option.

"With burglaries and theft on the rise, your valuables need to be vaulted," says Nick Fulton, managing partner at USA Pawn and chairman of the Mississippi Pawnbrokers Association. "It's much easier to move \$50,000 in gold to a safety deposit box versus silver. To put the weight amount into perspective, in today's market, it takes 85.55 ounces of silver to equal 1 ounce of gold."

When silver bars and coins are better for investors

Gold can be a smart choice for many investors, but for some, silver may be the better fit — particularly if you're on a tight budget. This is because silver comes at a much lower price than gold, allowing you to purchase more of it for the same amount.

It also offers you a chance at higher returns, and it can be especially profitable in good economic times, Earle says.

"During periods of strong economic expansion, when inflation is low and employment expanding at a noninflationary rate, silver may rise simply owing to expanded industrial use," Earle says. Meanwhile, he says, growth in gold is more likely to be "muted," particularly if inflation and geopolitical tensions are low.



Finally, you might want to invest in silver if you're expecting a surge in demand for products that require silver in their manufacturing.

"Gold is primarily used for jewelry only, while silver is a significant component in green energy, like solar panels and also medical devices," says Nicholas Ganesh, managing member of Endeavor Metals Group. "So if you are making a bet on a more macro theme, silver may be a better option."

Deciding between gold and silver

Both gold and silver have their uses, but if you're not sure which is best to invest in right now, there are a few things you should consider, experts say. First, know your purpose for the investment. If it's to produce high returns, opt for silver. If you're looking more for a safe way to protect your wealth and beat inflation, consider gold.

You can also look at market conditions, including gold and silver prices, for guidance. "Factors such as supply and demand dynamics, geopolitical events, and economic indicators can influence the prices of different forms of precious metals," says Alex Ebkarian, co-founder of Allegiance Gold.

And if you still can't decide, opt for buying both, as long you have the budget for it. "Consider diversifying your wealth into gold and silver, versus choosing one over the other," Ebkarian says.
